

This year we had an astounding 73 students complete the Premiers' Reading Challenge!







SWITCHES

The students at BSDS have been doing an amazing job this year at using single button switches!



There are a variety of switches that are used at school such as:


- switches to communicate a message, such as 'more', 'finished', 'help', 'yes' and 'no'.
- switches that can activate an electronic device, such as a blender, lights and different toys.
- switches that can activate a variety of sounds, songs and animations on a computer.

Switches can be used to increase engagement in programs and support the development of many of the foundational skills needed to use other communication systems.

Staff have been very creative at embedding the use of these switches into programs to support literacy activities, make stories more interactive and promote engagement across a variety of programs such as cooking, science and morning or afternoon meeting.

DEVELOPING SELF-CARE SKILLS

Self-care skills are important for every child to learn, but can be particularly empowering for children with disabilities. By teaching your child how to care for themselves, you can help them gain independence and confidence throughout their day-to-day life.





What are self-care skills?

There are four main categories of skills we use in everyday life:









Tips for promoting self-care skills

Give lots of opportunities to practice

When teaching your child self-care skills, provide them with plenty of opportunities to practice the new tasks they are learning. Practice goals that you want to target at home, school and wherever else is appropriate so your child gets exposure across different environments.

Follow routines and a daily schedule

Try to stick to routines as much as you can. Utilise a visual schedule to help your child understand what steps come next to build their independence in the task. As your child becomes more independent, the goal is for them to use the schedule themselves and finish tasks without being asked or needing reminders.

Break down a task into simpler and easier parts:

Breaking down a task into simpler and easier parts can make big life skills seem less overwhelming. Occupational therapists will often suggest 'forward chaining' or 'backward chaining'. This refers to the process of breaking up a task into small parts, then teaching the easiest part first.

For example, instead of teaching your child to brush their teeth all at once, you could break it down into these following steps:

- 1. Holding the toothbrush
- 2. Wetting the toothbrush
- 3. Squeezing toothpaste onto brush
- 4. Moving the toothbrush in circular motions on the teeth
