


WHAT THE LADYBIRD HEARD IN ROOM 3S

This term, students in Room 3S have been reading 'What the Ladybird Heard' by Julia Donaldson. They have had exciting opportunities to explore various temperatures through sensory experiences, such as ice-cold water from the pond, and warm feathers from the red hen.

Using AAC and Talking Tiles by Boardmaker, the students delved into a variety of animal noises. This story has been terrific for sound differentiation, such as tractors, squeaky gates, various farm animal sounds, and even the footsteps of the robbers. We have had so much fun learning this term!















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RUN, RUN AS FAST AS YOU CAN, JOIN ROOM 18, 28 & THE GINGERBREAD MAN!

As part of our combined program, 'Stars of the Show', students in Room 18 and 28 took to the stage together to perform the story, 'The Gingerbread Man!' Each week, students practised choosing different farm animals to dress up as before chasing the Gingerbread Man, all while repeating the short phrase, "Run, Run as fast as you can! You can't catch me, I'm the Gingerbread Man." Students copied the sounds of the different animals and imitated the actions of the dances in front of their peers. Afterwards, they returned to their chairs to watch and cheer on their peers, while attending and pointing to familiar symbols on their story specific ALDs and Vocab Books to answer simple questions. 
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PETE'S A PIZZA WITH HARMONY










MEG AND MOG & ROOM 29

























COOKING WITH ROOM 5S & 6S

INDEPENDENT LIVING SKILLS



Independence can manifest in various ways for your child. They might be starting to make decisions by choosing between options, or successfully completing multi-step tasks.


To foster greater independence, challenging tasks are broken down into step-by-step processes and regularly practiced. These steps are sometimes paired with verbal and visual prompts.

For example, a student may be working on preparing their own toasted sandwich. The steps can be broken down in to:

- 1. Put two slices of bread onto a plate.
- 2. Spread butter on the bread.
- Grate some cheese on a plate.
- Put cheese on 1 slice of bread.
- 5. Close the sandwich.
- 6. Turn the sandwich press on
- 7. Put the sandwich in the press, close the lid and wait.
- 8. Cook until toasted.

Allowing your child to make their own decisions from time to time is also great way to increase independence. For example, rather than helping your child to work through a list, maybe you give them the option between putting cheese or jam in their sandwich.

Coffee Club with Room 21s

On Thursday afternoons, assigned students visit classrooms, providing staff with a QR code for placing coffee orders. Staff members use the QR code to submit their orders. The assigned students then organize the orders using prepared visuals that specify the type of coffee, milk and amount of sugar for each order.

On Monday mornings, students in Room 21S participate in Coffee Club, where they serve up some of the best coffees in town! Supported by staff, students learn to prepare the coffee machine, milk and milk jugs, make coffees, deliver them to the correct rooms and staff, and clean materials and preparation area.

Coffee Club is a great way to teach life skills to students and create a sense of community within our school. The life skills we practice include following a recipe, sequencing steps in an activity, fulfilling an order, demonstrating appropriate social skills, sharing, working collaboratively with peers, and enhancing reading and comprehension.
