A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

I would like to remind parents and carers that our school day runs from 8:50am until 3:00pm.

🕤 LATE ARRIVALS

EARLY DEPARTURES




NATIONAL APPLE PIE DAY

They followed the steps in the story to make their own Apple Pie in a cup!
















ALL ABOARD!




PERFORMING ARTS AT BSDS

Augmented and Alternative Communication (AAC)

At BSDS, we use a wide range of Augmented and Alternative Communication (AAC) to support students to express themselves and to understand others. Using AAC also helps students to:

- Engage and participate in all programs
- Build independence and autonomy
- Support literacy skills, including reading comprehension
- Understand the expectations of their environments



Some examples of AAC that we use every day at BSDS are:

- Key Word Sign
- School-wide symbols
- Aided Language Displays (ALDs)
- Visual schedules
- Pragmatic Organisation Dynamic Displays (PODD books)











The following information is shared on behalf of researchers at The Royal Children's Hospital, who are calling for medical research participants for a new study looking to better understand medicinal cannabis. Medicinal cannabis has recently been identified as a potential therapy for the management of behavioural symptoms in children with developmental disabilities.

Researchers in Melbourne and Sydney are currently looking for children aged 6 to 18 years with both an intellectual disability and severe behaviour problems (e.g., aggression and agitation) to participate in a randomised placebo-controlled trial of cannabidiol (CBD). CBD is a legal extract from the cannabis plant. It does not cause intoxication, and it is not addictive. If you think that your child may be eligible to participate and you would like further information, please email <u>mctrials@mcri.edu.au</u>

Please note that only children who meet the inclusion criteria and reside within Melbourne or Sydney can be included. The research team are unable to respond to queries outside the scope of this trial.
